
Mountain Beat with Sky King

Unlike other musicians and performers that grace our stage every Thursday evening, Tony came equipped with a small amplifier, an electric gui-tar and a bag full of electronic pedals and such that turned out to be his back up band so to speak. After getting him signed up and assessing his needs, he explained that he prerecorded his back up music in order to play lead guitar. After hearing Tony sing the first time I asked him if he knew this particular number to which he responded that yes he played it years back but would have to go back and relearn the song as it was full of minor chords and complicated progressions. Sure enough the next time Tony arrived to play he started telling the story of how I asked him to play this song and then launched into the most incredible version of "Old Man River" that I have ever heard. And it encompasses the entire stage version from the Broadway play.

You never know where you might see Tony play as he is always gigging somewhere around the area. But be assured that when you see his posters advertising "Red Hot Blues", you will not be disappointed!
